Our speaker: Mark Oakley



There are those who want to resolve the mystery of God...and those who seek to deepen it.; they have come to believe that truth is not the same thing as elimination of ambiguity.'

It has become evident to me that we do not find it easy to talk about faith's darkness, yet we find release and companionship when we do.'

'I still believe God is understood in collage – in a slow, patient and puzzled piecing together of hints and guesses, epiphanies and surprises...and the living of life with all its loves and losses.'

'In my Christian discipleship, I have found poetry indispensable...it has captured, briefly but uniquely, moments of recognition and epiphany.'

The Reverend Canon Mark Oakley is Dean of Chapel at St John's College, Cambridge, where he oversees worship, the activities of the choirs and also carries a pastoral responsibility for members of the college community. He was formerly Canon Chancellor of St Paul's Cathedral where he had been ordained in 1993.

His early ministry was in London, including four years' service as Chaplain to the Bishop of London and then, in 2005, he became Archdeacon of Germany and Northern Europe. He is also a Deputy Priest in Ordinary to HM The Queen, and a Visiting Lecturer in the Department of Theology and Religious Studies at King's College, London.

He is a passionate campaigner for social justice and human rights, receiving one of the first National Hate Crime Awards in 2016 for his work amongst minority groups. He is an ambassador for the charity Stop Hate UK as well as being a Trustee of several bodies including Liberty. He was described by Baroness Chakrabarti, former Director of Liberty, as "a great man of faith, hope and humanity".

It would be an understatement to say Mark has a way with words! As well as an engaging speaker, his writing is inspirational and accessible. *The Collage of God* (2001), a best-seller, was widely praised as 'a book that captures the intellect and the imagination' (Theology in Scotland) and 'a book about the spiritual that radiates laughter' (The Tablet).

On *The Splash of Words* (2016), the poet Imtiaz Dharker said "Dipping in to this book, the spirit is cleansed in the sparkle of language", and from Andrew Motion: "Mark Oakley has a strong sense of language as sacrament, a sharp eye for telling phrases and a warm heart with which to return echoes".
